# TALENT MANAGEMENT, HUMAN RESOURCE ANALYTICS AND SUCCESSION PLANNING IN SELECTED CORPORATE INSTITUTIONS IN NIGERIA.

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#### **ABSTRACT**

The operational sustainability of Human Resource (HR) operations depends heavily on the engagement of technology to adopt and deploy HR analytics. The main objective of the study is to examine talent management and succession planning with the mediating effect of HR analytics. A quantitative research method was adopted, in which a well-structured questionnaire was used to collect data from the target respondents of the study. The study population was 790 respondents from the selected enterprises and Yamane's (1967) sample size determination formula was used in the study and the sample size was 266 respondents. The study used partial least squares structural equation modelling (PLS-SEM) to test the research hypotheses and analysed the correlation as well as the significant impact between human resource analytics, talent management and succession planning in modern Nigerian businesses. The results show a positive and significant relationship between talent management and succession planning. This study also shows the positive impact of HR analytics on talent management and succession planning in Nigerian businesses. The study specifically concludes that talent management has an influence on the sustainability of succession planning through the mediating effect of human capital analytics. The study recommends that HR strategic thinkers continue to adopt new technologies that can accelerate the effective implementation of HR analytics, and that consistent training and development can help promote HR and talent management will meet succession planning expectations in the modern business environment.

#### **INTRODUCTION**

Human resource analytics (HRA), also known as workforce analytics or talent analytics, involves using data analytics and technology to better understand various aspects of an workforce. organization's Human capital technology-based analytics is a human resources practice that modern businesses are adopting and implementing to improve the performance and sustainability of their HR departments, while simultaneously helping make data-driven decisions. The primary goal is to improve overall HR processes, workforce efficiency, and organizational performance through data-driven decisions. In today's global organizational environment, HR activities have evolved from traditional methods to more innovative and digitized approaches. These changes are driven by continuous technological innovations, growth, development, and the recent COVID-19 pandemic, which has brought transformational changes to human resource practices in modern business contexts (Polisetty et al., 2024; Pandey et al., 2023).

These evolving environmental factors have led to the adoption and practice of human resource

(HR) analytics in the modern business environment. The application of HR analytics helps HR leaders and managers make effective and sustainable data-driven decisions, better understand resource practices through data analysis and visualization, and consistently improve performance (Thakur et al., 2024). Practicing HR analytics can assist in making data-driven talent decisions. improving workforce processes, and recruiting and retaining a talented and experienced workforce in modern business settings. Recent studies indicate that HR analytics is integral to sustainable and profitable global business environments (Thakur et al., 2024; Allaham, 2022; Patil & Priya, 2024), and its practice has significantly influenced by technological innovations (Xu et al., 2022; Xiao, 2022). Strategically, HR analytics talent management, workforce supports planning. development, career human resources, and succession planning functionalities (Toine et al., 2022).

Talent management and succession planning are essential aspects of human resource management in modern organizations, ensuring effective retention of employee skills and ensuring continuity, stability, and long-term success. Both involve strategic approaches to managing an organization's workforce, focusing on creating a team of competent individuals capable of filling key roles. Talent encompasses management attracting, identifying, developing, and retaining the best talent within an organization. Succession planning identifies and develops potential future leaders or key employees who can assume critical roles when needed. These processes are crucial for organizational resilience and long-term success in a dynamic business environment (Kolachina et al., 2024).

The integration of HR analytics enhances talent management and succession planning efforts, aiming to improve workforce efficiency, talent retention, and organizational sustainability in modern businesses (Kaliannan et al., 2023; McCaig et al., 2022; Bano et al., 2022; Ratnawati et al., 2022). Adopting and

implementing HR analytics to achieve and sustain talent management and succession challenges planning poses for modern businesses in Nigeria. While several studies have explored talent management, succession planning, and HR analytics from various perspectives, particularly in developmental contexts (Thakur et al., 2024; Toine et al., 2022; Xiao, 2022; Kaliannan et al., 2023; Ratnawati et al., 2022; McCartney & Fu, 2022; Kiran et al., 2022; Jindal & Shaikh, 2020), none have specifically addressed the mediating impact of HR analytics on talent management and corporate succession planning in Nigeria.

Moreover, existing studies on reconciling HR with talent management analytics succession planning often present limited literature, and their findings and conclusions sometimes contradict, leaving the relevance of HR analytics to modern HR practices unclear. Addressing these gaps, this study aims to examine talent management and succession planning in Nigerian businesses, focusing on the mediating impact of human resource (HR) analytics to contribute knowledge in these areas. The study utilized quantitative research collecting data methods. through wellquestionnaires from selected structured settings corporate in Nigeria. The main objective of the study was to examine HR analytics effect on talent management and succession planning of selected corporate settings in Nigeria. The specific objectives are to:

- i. Investigate the mediating effect of HR analytics on talent management of selected corporate settings in Nigeria.
- ii. Evaluate the effect of HR analytics on succession planningof selected corporate settings in Nigeria.

## **Research Hypotheses**

**H01:** HR analytics does not mediate the relation between talent management and succession planning of selected corporate settings in Nigeria.

**H02:** HR analytics has no effect on succession planning of selected corporate settings in Nigeria.

#### LITERATURE REVIEW

## **HR Analytics**

Human resources (HR) analytics is driven by the strategic alignment of new technology and innovation. HR analytics is an ever-evolving in human resources practice, concept encompassing the adoption and application of technological data to source, attract and retain talent in the modern business environment (Polisetty, et al. 2024). This involves adopting and implementing data-driven intelligence systems to help ensure the effectiveness and sustainability of talent planning, talent development, talent management and planning succession in modern organizations. People analytics is a systematic technology approach used to drive organizational talent and sustainable performance through operational systems that analyse strategic and critical data across the department. the company's human resources department (Thakur, 2024). Human capital analytics using modern techniques helps drive investment in the workforce organizations achieve to operational sustainability and profitability in the business even during environment environmental changes hard. The analytical aspects of HR focus on strategic and critical pillars connected to employees, including employee retention and turnover analytics, training and development analytics, and systems analytics rewards and remuneration, motivation analysis, work environment analysis, performance and analysis, recruitment process productivity analysis and corporate culture analysis in organizations (Patil & Priya, 2024). Effectively applying and practicing HR analytics can help modern businesses optimize operations, improve performance and overall employee experience, and reduce recruitment costs. employ and retain their workforce.

Recent studies had specifically investigated how technological variables such as artificial intelligence can be applied to improve HR analytics applications (Pandey, et al. 2024; Rodgers, et al. 2023) and the implications of HR analytics. HR analytics for HR management has contributed to strategically driving business performance in the modern business landscape (Madhani, 2023). Allaham, (2022) specifically concluded that many research studies was HR analytics and their findings were applied in organizations (Xu et al., 2022; Xiao, 2022). Ekka and Singh (2022) concluded that the application and practice of HR analytics has a significant and positive impact on operational performance and sustainability of units and departments. human resources, as well as an overall view of employee performance in modern era. business organizations. McCartney and Fu (2022) specifically believe that HR analytics methods can be applied to performance improve organizational sustainability. Koirala and Mishra, (2022) believe that the application and practice of HR analytics has also contributed to the assessment of HR activities and practices in the modern business environment. Xiao, (2022) emphasizes the positive strategic significance of applying the Internet of Things (IoT) and big data analytics in the human resource management of modern enterprises. Toine et al. (2022) also supports the revalidation and credibility of innovative human resource management, digitalization and transformation approaches in modern organizations. Margherita, (2022) believes that HR analytics will be an effective and sustainable driver for HR activities in the near future. The study demonstrates the potential value of technology and innovation in the practice of HR analytics and value creation

for the performance and sustainability of modern organizations (Margherita, 2022). Soares, et al. (2022) also conducted a systematic review of the effectiveness and operational sustainability of applying and implementing HR analytics in modern business environments. Another study also emphasizes the mediating impact of HR analytics on the management and development of sustainable human resources as well as the sustainability of organizational performance in the modern digital era (Kiran, et al. 2022). Thakre, (2021) concluded on the effectiveness and sustainability of HR analytics for organizational innovation. Human resource analytics, according to Belizón and Kieran, (2021), promotes legitimate processes in human resource practices in modern organizations. The study conducted by Singh and Malhotra (2020) focused and concluded that HR analytics has improved the efficiency and effectiveness of management activities towards organization's HR. Karmaska, (2020) focuses and emphasizes the importance of human resource analytics in modern organizations for the effectiveness and sustainability of human resource management.

#### **Talent Management (TM)**

Talent management can best be described as the process of applying strategic thinking by senior managers and HR leaders to attract, organize, motivate and retain a talented workforce. the highest and most productive of the organization. Effective and sustainable talent management in the modern business environment helps attract and retain the best talent to organizations, which has a significant impact on building consistent operational sustainability as well as such as planning and executing succession work smoothly. The human resources department of any organization will benefit from operational smoothness and efficiency when effectively implementing talent management (Kolachina, et al. 2024). Talent management involves consistently developing personnel needed to align with the organization's succession plan. Implementing effective talent management can help enhance talent attraction, development and retention, as well as employee performance and satisfaction in the modern business environment. Recent studies had investigated the relationship between the impact and impact talent management on employee performance and organizational sustainability in a comprehensive manner (Kaliannan et al., 2023; McCaig et al. 2022). McCaig et al. (2022), opined that talent management is a organizational source of enhanced competitiveness and competitive advantage. Talent management, according to Kaliannan et al. (2023), is the improvement of talent development among an organization's employees. That is, effective talent management improves the efficiency and smoothness of the recruitment process in organizations. The effectiveness of employee engagement is a result of flexibility in talent management in modern companies. That is, adopting and implementing digital talent management methods can effectively and organizational sustainably improve performance. A study also found that talent management has a strategic impact employee satisfaction and company performance (Siripipatthanakul et al. 2022). Shinta, et al. (2022) specifically assert that succession planning can be achieved effectively and sustainably through talent management in modern organizations. Louis, Sulaiman, and Zakaria (2022) also concluded that talent management in the context of corporate improves accounting auditors' overall performance. Kaewnaknaew et al. (2022) discussed the impact of talent management on the performance of a construction company. Sindhura, (2022) emphasizes the impact of talent management strategies in optimizing HR operations in modern organizations. One study concluded that technological innovation has changed the way talent is managed in today's digital age (Stopochkin, et al. 2022). Another implementing claims that study management strategies can help increase the efficiency and sustainability of HR operations in organizations (Hassanein & zgit, 2022; Ratnawati, et al. 2022).

## **Succession Planning (SP)**

Succession planning is an important issue in modern businesses to meet the unforeseen needs of leadership and management changes. In other words, effective succession planning helps replace top talent who leave the organization. Well-structured succession planning frees the organization from searching for talent and successors to meet urgent needs. Effective succession planning helps modern businesses manage talent pipelines and enable to drive and improve successors sustainability of their operations and profitability. Succession planning can also be described as planning for the replacement of talented people who leave the organization. Succession planning can best be described as the strategy adopted by strategic leaders to replace emerging talent with retired or lost talent within their organization (Hoque & Zheng, 2024). It is simply described as a structured process to replace departing talent with trained successors within organizations. and capabilities of succession Strengths planning in human resource management Effective and sustainable in the context of modern public and private business worldwide (Okeke, et al. 2022; Bano, et al.2022). Recent studies had strongly agreed that succession planning is key to the operational sustainability, profitability, and competitiveness of family businesses (Natadilaga, et al. 2024; Okeke et al. 2022; Awogbemi, et al. 2022; John & LeCounte, 2020). That is, succession planning practices in modern organizations can help enhance performance and sustainability. Bano et al. (2022) emphasize the importance of succession planning for the operational sustainability and profitability of businesses of all sizes. Nurudeen (2022) described the impact of succession planning on the performance strength of small and medium enterprises (SMEs) in Nigeria with intervention in organizational culture. Batra and Kaur (2022) evaluated the significant impact of succession planning and workforce diversity in modern businesses. Sholesi, et al. (2022) concluded on the importance of succession planning on the performance and sustainability of manufacturing companies in Nigeria.




Fig. 1.2: Mediating Effect of HR Analytics on Talent Management and Succession Planning (Researchers, 2023)

The above model proposes and demonstrates the correlating impact of talent management and succession planning with the mediating impact of HR analytics in the modern business environment. HR analytics uses a modern technological variable called a "dashboard" to report events occurring in HR practices in TM and SP terms, known as "descriptive analytics." HR analytics also uses technology variables to show the future impact of TM and SP on organization: this is called "predictive analytics" and when HR analytics is applied within the organization comes action options and corrective measures to adopt to avoid the unforeseen impact of TM and SP for the

organizations, this is called "prescriptive analytics." HR analytics can help streamline the and sustainability effectiveness relationship between talent management and succession planning in the modern business environment. Diagnostic analytics identify data on remote and immediate causes of gaps that may arise in talent management and impact succession planning, and extract solutions and data necessary to overcome the causes of talent gaps and staff turnover in the organization. The model shows that effective talent management in modern companies leads sustainable succession planning, implementation and management. The model also reveals that smooth talent management can bring about positive changes in employee talent planning and development, while helping to optimize planning, development, and growth. development and effectiveness of career management in organizations. This improvement can lead to more effective and long-term succession planning, as well as improved operational sustainability and overall organizational profitability.

## **Theoretical Framework**

This study has strategically linked and underpinned two (2) theories as theoretically Evidence-Based based. namely, the Management (EBM) Theory (Bezzina, et al. 2017) and dynamic capabilities theory (Winter, 2003). Evidence-Based Management (EBM) is an approach that involves making decisions and taking actions based on the best available evidence, integrating scientific findings with practical wisdom and organizational values. This concept is rooted in the broader movement of evidence-based practice, which originated in medicine and has been applied to various fields, including management. When aligning EBM with HR analytics, talent management, and succession planning, organizations can benefit from a more data-driven and informed approach to managing their human capital. By integrating EBM principles with HR analytics, talent management, and succession planning, organizations can create a more strategic and evidence-based approach to managing their

workforce. This alignment helps in making informed decisions that lead to improved organizational performance and employee satisfaction. According to EBM theory, the strength of HR analytics in organizations depends heavily on the facts and evidence from senior managers and HR leaders in talent management and succession planning. Studies had justified the adoption of EBM Theory on HR analytics research in various perspectives (Lathabhavan, 2023; McCartney, & Fu, 2022; Si, et al. 2023). Evidence-Based Management theory, when applied in conjunction with HR analytics, can significantly enhance effectiveness of talent management and succession planning in Nigerian corporate settings. By making data-driven decisions, mitigating biases, and optimizing resource allocation, organizations can better identify, develop, and retain top talent, ensuring longterm success and sustainability in the dynamic business environment of Nigeria.

Dynamic capabilities (DC) Theory emphasized on the firm's ability to integrate, build, and reconfigure internal and external competencies to address rapidly changing environments. Dynamic capabilities are considered essential for a company's long-term success as they enable organizations to adapt to changing market conditions, seize new opportunities, and respond effectively to challenges. Dynamic capabilities refer to an organization's ability to integrate, build, and reconfigure internal and external competencies to address rapidly changing environments. In the context of human resources (HR), dynamic capabilities involve the capacity to adapt and respond to changes in the workforce, technology, and market conditions. This includes the ability to attract, develop, and retain talented employees, aligning HR strategies with the overall organizational goals. Based on DC theory HR analytics can provide valuable insights into talent management and succession planning. In summary, the alignment of dynamic capabilities with HR analytics in talent management and succession planning is crucial for organizations to stay competitive and agile in the face of evolving HR management environments. The combination of strategic practices, HR

adaptability, and data-driven decision-making supports effective workforce planning and development and succession in organizations. Dynamic Capabilities (DC) theory posits that HR analytics is a capability that can improve the and sustainability effectiveness organizational resources, especially talent management, to achieve succession planning coherent. According to DC theory, HR analytics links the significant impacts of the relationship between talent management and succession planning in modern organizations. Recent studies had adopted DC theoretical lens to justify their research on HR analytics in various perspectives (Pillai, & Srivastava, Thakur, et al. 2024; Bahuguna, et al. 2023). By integrating dynamic capabilities theory with HR analytics, Nigerian businesses can enhance their ability to effectively manage talent and plan for succession in a rapidly changing environment. This approach enables organizations to better anticipate, adapting to changing business contexts, talent identification and development, boosting organization learning and knowledge management and respond to talent-related challenges while also leveraging data-driven insights to support strategic decision-making.

#### **Empirical Reviews**

McCartney and Fu (2022) studied the impact of HR analytics on organizational performance and operational sustainability. The study examines the vitality of applying HR analytics to improve sustainability in business operations. The sample size of the study was 155 Irish companies. A questionnaire was used to collect data from the selected companies and SEM-PLS was used to analyse the collected data. According to research findings, HR analytics has a significant impact on the performance and sustainability of Irish businesses. Ratnawati et (2022) conducted research on talent management and succession planning modern organizations. The main objective of the study is to examine the influence of talent management on organizational succession planning. The study reviewed a number of works, books and articles related to the effectiveness of talent management succession planning. The study found, after reviewing several literatures. that talent management has a strategic impact on an organization's overall succession plan. Kiran et al. (2022) studied the impact of HR analytics on HR management and organizational sustainability. The study aims to examine the correlation that exists between HR analytics, HR management and sustainability in the performance of organizations. A systematic literature review was used in the research methodology, revealing that HR analytics has a strategic impact on HR management and the operational sustainability overall organizations.

Thakur et al. (2024) conducted a study on HR creative problem solving, analytics. business performance: moderator-mediator analysis using PLS-SEM. This study explores how human resource analytics (HRA) can improve human resource management (HRM) performance and organizational performance, with creative problem-solving ability (CPSC) mediating Basic solution to create value from HRA. The hypotheses are tested in an empirical study including 191 firms using partial least squares structural equation modelling techniques. The results confirm the direct and indirect effects of HRA adoption and maturity on HRM and organizational performance, as well as the mediating role of CPSC. The expertise of HRA staff is believed to moderate the relationship between HRA and CPSC, with data quality being an important factor. Jindal and Shaikh, (2020) studied the effectiveness of talent management in succession planning: a proposed model for pharmaceutical companies. The study examines the relationship between talent identification (TID), talent development (TD), talent retention (TR) and succession planning in Indian pharmaceutical companies. A survey method was used to collect responses from senior executives of pharmaceutical companies in Hyderabad, India. The population was 367 people and the sample size was determined to be 340 people. The hypothesized model and structural relationships were tested through structural equation modelling (SEM). Research results show that TR plays a mediating role in the relationship between TID, TD and succession planning in the organization.

This research helps pharmaceutical companies prepare for the future in succession planning by making skilful use of their conventional talent management strategies. This study well develops the empirical relationship between TID, TD and real estate planning with the mediating effect of TR.

#### **METHODOLOGY**

The methodology adopted in the study was quantitative research, and the study used a causal research design to ascertain correlative effect of HR on analytics on talent management and succession planning in corporate The modern settings. data requirements source adopted on the variables of talent HR analytics. management plaining were closed-ended succession questionnaire and it was adequately administered to the selected corporate settings in Nigeria.

Selected corporate settings in Nigeria, where ShopRite, MTN Nigeria, GOBAL Nigeria, First Banks Nigeria Limited, Zenith Bank Plc and MultiChoice Nigeria Limited, were selected based on consistent performance in public operations their different industrial operation. The target population of the study managerial and non-managerial employees in the selected business contexts. This resulted in a total of 790 respondents from the selected companies. Taro Yamane's (1967) sample size determination formula was used in the study.

The sample size was 266 respondents. To avoid problems of no response, questionnaires being filled out incorrectly, and questionnaires possibly being lost, a sample size of 30 percent was provided and added to the sample to compensate for these limitations (Anderson, et al. 2017; Cochran, 1963). 30% of 266 = 80, so 80 + 266 = 346. To obtain complete and general information, this was allocated 30% to management employees and 70% to non-management employees.

The source of data collection for this study was the primary source of data and was collected directly from employees of the selected Abuja, companies in Nigeria through questionnaire. The use of primary data by researchers management in talent succession planning, with the help of HR analytics, has significantly enabled collection of data that can help obtain results and Conclusion based on real-time information on the topic. The study sent 21 items in the questionnaire, of which 7 items were taken from each variable to each company employee via email in Abuja, and 296 respondents answered and completed the questionnaire accurately. Researchers used HR analytics questionnaire in talent management and succession planning to provide a comprehensive, data-driven approach to understand the workforce planning and development workforce in a selected corporate workforce environment in Abuja, Nigeria. Surveys and questionnaires enabled research teams to collect quantitative data on the skills, aspirations and career goals of employees at selected companies in Abuja, Nigeria. This information is valuable for understanding the current skill set of the workforce in the selected corporate settings. Questionnaire data helped researchers create talent profiles and identify potential successors for key roles among selected companies in Abuja, Nigeria.

## Validity and Reliability of Research Instruments

The study used content validity to measure talent management and succession planning

questionnaires with the help of HR analytics. Content validity was used to help ensure that the question items accurately captured relevant aspects of these concepts. Content validity clearly defines the concepts used to measure talent management, succession planning, and human capital analytics. This ensures that the question items correspond to the concepts intended to be used in the study. The researchers sought advice from experts in the fields of talent management, succession planning and human capital analytics. These experts helped provide valuable information about the content and relevance of the questionnaire Considering the mediation of HR analytics, the researchers ensured that the questionnaire included items related to data-driven decision making, use of analytics, and impact of analytics on processes succession planning and talent management in a selected corporate setting in Abuja. The reliability of the questionnaire used in talent management and succession planning with the help of HR analytics ensured the consistency and stability of the measurement tool. The study used the statistical measure Cronbach's Alpha evaluate the internal consistency of the questionnaire items and showed that the items had the same structure as 0.7 or higher. The study used partial least squares structural equation modelling (PLS-SEM) to test the research hypotheses and analyse the correlation as well as the significant impact between human resource analysis, human resource management, and human resource analysis focusing on structural and measurement model between research variables. SEM was used by the researchers to evaluate the effect of HR analytics in the relationship between talent management and succession planning. The researchers examine how HR analytics mediates or explains the relationship between talent management practices and outcomes using SEM. Researchers used SEM to test and validate theoretical models HR analytics items which are (descriptive analytics, predictive analytics, prescriptive analytics and diagnostic analytics) on talent management development, talent retention and talent acquisition) and succession planning by comparing hypothetical models with actual data and these are in consistent with studies of Ekka, and Singh, (2022); Batra, and Kaur, (2022); Jindal, and Shaikh, (2020); Kolachina, et al. (2024); Pandey, et al. (2024); Patil and Priya, (2024).

## RESULTS AND DISCUSSION OF FINDINGS

#### HR (HR Analytics):

- ATT1 <- HR: This indicates that the first indicator of the latent variable Attitude (ATT) is directly loaded by HR Analytics (HR) with a parameter estimate of 1.000. Since this loading is fixed at 1.000, it is not necessary to provide standard errors, t-values, or p-values for this indicator.
- ATT2 <- HR: The second indicator of Attitude (ATT) is loaded by HR Analytics (HR) with an estimated loading of 0.993. The associated t-

value is 43.399, suggesting high statistical significance.
