# RISING PRICES AND INFLATION ON SMALL BUSINESSES IN NIGERIA: AN ECONOMIC ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FEDERAL AND STATE GOVERNMENTS

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## **ABSTRACT**

This study examines the impact of rising prices and inflation on small businesses in Nigeria and provides recommendations to the Federal and State Governments of Nigeria to address this issue. The study employs a mixed-methods research design, combining quantitative and qualitative data collection and analysis methods. The quantitative data is collected through a survey of small businesses in Nigeria, while the qualitative data is collected through in-depth interviews with small business owners and key stakeholders. The study finds that inflation has had a significant negative impact on the sales, profits, and operations of small businesses in Nigeria. The key economic factors contributing to inflation in Nigeria are rising costs of production, increased demand, changes in government policy, and exchange rate fluctuations. Small businesses in Nigeria face a number of challenges in coping with rising prices and inflation, including reduced profit margins, difficulty accessing financing, increased competition, difficulty planning for the future, and reduced consumer demand. The study recommends that the government take steps to address the key economic factors that are contributing to inflation in Nigeria. The government should also implement policies and interventions to help small businesses cope with the impact of inflation. This could include providing financial assistance, promoting access to financing, and providing training and technical assistance.

in higher production costs, which can diminish profit margins and hinder the competitiveness of small businesses.

The impact of rising prices and inflation on small businesses in Nigeria has been extensively studied by researchers and policymakers. A recent study by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) (2022) revealed that small businesses in Nigeria experienced a significant decline in sales and profits due to rising inflation rates. The study attributed this decline to the increased cost of production and reduced consumer demand.

Another study by the Lagos Chamber of Commerce and Industry (LCCI) (2021) found that small businesses in Lagos State, Nigeria's commercial hub, faced challenges in accessing financing and managing cash flow due to rising inflation. The study recommended that the government implement policies to stabilize prices, reduce inflation, and provide financial support to small businesses.

These studies highlight the critical need to address the impact of rising prices and inflation businesses in Nigeria. small understanding the role of small businesses in the economy and analyzing the economic factors contributing to inflation, policymakers can develop effective interventions to mitigate the adverse effects of inflation on small businesses and foster their growth and development. The research problem addressed in this study is the impact of rising prices and inflation on small businesses in Nigeria. Inflation has emerged as a significant challenge for the Nigerian economy, leading to increased costs of living and doing business.

Small businesses, which constitute a substantial portion of the Nigerian economy, are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of inflation. By addressing these research problems, this study aims to provide valuable insights into the impact of inflation on small businesses in Nigeria and contribute to the development of effective recommendations to support small businesses and promote economic growth in the country. - 3. There is no significant difference in the operations of small businesses in Nigeria before and after the onset of inflation, controlling for other relevant factors.

# LITERATURE REVIEW AND THEORETICAL FOUNDATION

According to this theory, inflation is caused by an increase in the cost of production, such as wages, raw material prices, transportation costs. When businesses pass on these increased costs to consumers in the form of higher prices, inflation occurs. Inflation is a sustained increase in the general price level of goods and services in an economy over a period of time." - Milton Friedman. This theory is relevant to the present study because it suggests that rising prices and inflation can be caused by factors that are beyond the control of small businesses, such as rising costs of raw materials and transportation. This theory is relevant to the present study because it suggests that rising prices and inflation can be caused by factors that are related to consumer demand, such as increased government spending or a surge in consumer spending. Both the cost-push and demand-pull theories of inflation provide useful frameworks for understanding the causes of rising prices and inflation in Nigeria and their impact on small businesses. The present study will draw on these theories to analyze the data and develop policy recommendations.

## **Conceptual Review**

According to Mankiw (2020), pricing in an economy refers to the monetary value of goods and services. According to Hayes (2018), supply and demand interact to determine pricing. The monetary worth of products and services in the Nigerian economy is the definition of pricing that we use in this study. We'll look at how pricing has evolved over time and the effects these changes have had on small companies.

A prolonged rise in the average price of goods and services over an extended period of time in an economy is known as inflation (Mishkin, 2016). The Consumer Price Index (CPI), which records the costs of a basket of goods and services that consumers purchase, is commonly used to measure it. Numerous causes, such as growing production costs, rising demand, and shifts in governmental policies, can lead to inflation. In this study, we adopt the definition of inflation as a sustained increase in the general

price level of goods and services in the Nigerian economy. We'll look at Nigerian inflation's root causes and effects on small enterprises.

# Effects of Inflation on the Sales, Profits, and Operations of Small Businesses

Inflation can have a significant impact on the sales, profits, and operations of small businesses (National Bureau of Statistics (NBS, 2022). Inflation can lead to a decrease in sales for small businesses because consumers may be less likely to purchase goods and services when prices are rising (NBS, 2022). Small businesses may also find it difficult to compete with larger businesses that have more resources to weather the effects of inflation.

Inflation can also lead to a decrease in profits for small businesses because the cost of goods and services that they purchase may increase, while the prices that they can charge for their own goods and services may not be able to keep pace (Central Bank of Nigeria [CBN], 2021). This can squeeze profit margins and make it difficult for small businesses to survive. They may not be able to predict how their costs will change, which can make it difficult to make decisions about hiring, production, marketing.

When the cost of producing goods and services increases, businesses may pass on these costs to consumers in the form of higher prices. This can lead to inflation. For example, expansionary fiscal policy, which involves increasing government spending or cutting taxes, can lead to increased demand and inflation. Small businesses may be impacted by changes in government policy, such as changes in tax rates or regulations. (International Monetary Fund, 2022)

**Exchange rate fluctuations:** Changes in the exchange rate can also contribute to inflation. For example, a depreciation of the domestic currency can lead to higher prices for imported goods and services. Small businesses that rely on imported goods and services may be particularly impacted by exchange rate fluctuations. (World Bank, 2022)

# **Impact on Small Businesses:**

**Diminished sales:** Small companies may see a decline in sales as a result of inflation, as consumers may be less inclined to buy products and services when prices are rising. National Statistics Bureau, 2022).

**Diminished earnings:** Small companies may see a decline in profits due to inflation as the cost of the products and services they buy may rise, and their ability to charge for those products and services may not be able to keep up with demand. Nigeria's Central Bank, 2021).

**Cost increases:** The cost of labor, raw materials, and transportation are just a few of the expenses that small businesses may face as a result of inflation (International Monetary Fund, 2022).

Planning for the future can be challenging for small firms due to inflation, as they may not be able to forecast changes in their expenditures and income (World Bank, 2022).

# The Challenges Faced by Small Businesses in Coping with Rising Prices and Inflation

Agency of Nigeria (SMEDAN) provided a list of small enterprises that were registered, from which the sample was selected. Business size and industrial sector were used to stratify the sample.

A structured questionnaire was used to collect quantitative data from small business owners. The questionnaire covered topics such as the impact of inflation on sales, profits, and operations, as well as the challenges faced by small businesses in coping with inflation. Indepth interviews were conducted with a purposive sample of small business owners and key stakeholders, such as government officials, financial experts, and representatives from business associations. The interviews explored the impact of inflation on small businesses in more depth and provided insights into the challenges and opportunities faced by small businesses.

The quantitative data was analyzed using descriptive statistics, such as means, medians, and standard deviations. Inferential statistics, such as t-tests and ANOVA, were used to test the hypotheses of the study. The qualitative data was analyzed using thematic analysis. The data was coded and analyzed to identify emerging themes and patterns. Mixed-methods analysis: The quantitative and qualitative data was triangulated to provide a more comprehensive understanding of the impact of inflation on small businesses in Nigeria. The findings from the quantitative and qualitative data were compared and contrasted to identify areas of convergence and divergence.

# Discussion of Findings and Hypotheses Test Results

Table 1 presents data indicating that small enterprises in Nigeria have seen a notable decline in sales, profitability, and operational efficiency due to inflation. This is in line with other research findings that indicate fewer sales, poorer profitability, and operational interruptions for small firms might result from inflation (National Bureau of Statistics, 2022; Central Bank of Nigeria, 2021).

The findings in Table 2 demonstrate that growing production costs, rising demand, shifting governmental policies, and volatility in currency rates are the main economic variables driving Nigerian inflation. These elements may have a variety of effects on small firms, such as raising expenses, restricting their ability to obtain funding, and making it harder for them to compete.

Table 3's findings demonstrate the various obstacles Nigerian small firms must overcome to keep up with inflation and growing costs. These difficulties include lower profit margins, more competition, trouble obtaining funding, trouble

making long-term plans, and declining customer demand.

The findings shown in Table 4 demonstrate the many measures the Nigerian government has implemented to lessen the effect of inflation on small enterprises. These actions consist of giving out grants and loans, lowering taxes, encouraging financial access, offering technical help and training, and setting up company accelerators and incubators.

The results in Table 5 show that there are a number of additional policies and interventions that can be implemented to address the impact of inflation on small businesses and foster their growth and development. These policies and interventions include fiscal policy, monetary policy, regulatory policy, financial assistance, promoting access to financing, providing training and technical assistance, and creating business incubators and accelerators.

The findings of this study suggest that inflation has had a significant negative impact on small businesses in Nigeria. The study also identified a number of challenges that small businesses face in coping with rising prices and inflation. The study recommends a number of policies and interventions that can be implemented to address the impact of inflation on small businesses and foster their growth and development.

The results of the hypothesis tests (Tables 6, 7, and 8) show that there is a significant difference in the sales, profits, and operations of small businesses in Nigeria before and after the onset of inflation. This suggests that inflation has had a negative impact on small businesses in Nigeria.

In Table 6, the results of the hypothesis test for sales show that there is a significant difference in the sales of small businesses in Nigeria before and after the onset of inflation (t = -12.34, p < 0.001). This suggests that inflation has led to a decrease in sales for small businesses in Nigeria.

In Table 7, the results of the hypothesis test for profits show that there is a significant difference in the profits of small businesses in Nigeria before and after the onset of inflation ( $t=-15.43,\ p<0.001$ ). This suggests that inflation has led to a decrease in profits for small businesses in Nigeria.

In Table 8, the results of the hypothesis test for operations show that there is a significant difference in the operations of small businesses in Nigeria before and after the onset of inflation (t = -13.72, p < 0.001). This suggests that inflation has disrupted the operations of small businesses in Nigeria.

Overall, the findings of this study suggest that inflation is a major challenge for small businesses in Nigeria. Inflation can lead to a decrease in sales, profits, and operations and can make it difficult for small businesses to cope with rising prices and other economic challenges.

#### CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATION

The main findings of this study are as follows:

- 1. Inflation has had a significant negative impact on the sales, profits, and operations of small businesses in Nigeria.
- 2. The key economic factors contributing to inflation in Nigeria are rising costs of

- production, increased demand, changes in government policy, and exchange rate fluctuations.
