

EFFECT OF FOCUS STRATEGY ON THE PERFORMANCE OF GUINNESS NIGERIA PLC, ABUJA

Abstract

This study investigates the impact of focus strategies on the performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja, with the main goal of evaluating how market and product-focused strategies affect performance. Utilizing a descriptive research design, the study had a population of 260 employees from Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja. A stratified random sampling method was employed to select a sample of 188 respondents was determined using the Taro Yamane statistical technique, and data were collected using a well-structured questionnaire. The gathered data were analyzed through regression analysis using SPSS version 27.0 to test the hypotheses. The analysis revealed that market-focused strategies significantly influence the performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc. The study concludes that the implementation of a combination of these focus strategies positively impacts performance. Based on the findings, it is recommended that Guinness Nigeria Plc should continue to develop and implement market-focused strategies. By maintaining a clear strategic direction, the company can further boost employee motivation and overall performance, thereby ensuring sustained productivity and a competitive edge in the market

INTRODUCTION

In the global business environment, organizations constantly searched for strategies to enhance their competitiveness and ensure long-term sustainability. Among these strategies, focus strategies—encompassing Product Focus and Market Focus—emerged as crucial for achieving organizational excellence. As industries evolved, understanding the dynamics of focus strategies became essential for companies aiming to navigate complexities and improve performance. These strategies enabled firms to allocate resources effectively and tailor their offerings to serve specific customer segments, product categories, or geographic markets.

In the fiercely competitive marketplace, a well-defined business strategy proved vital for organizational success and longevity. A key strategic choice involved targeting either a broad market or a narrow market segment. By concentrating on a particular buyer group, product line, or regional market, focus strategies allowed organizations to customize their offerings and develop specialized

expertise (Gupta & Lonial, 2020). This tailored approach significantly enhanced organizational performance in industries characterized by complexity and rapid change. Consequently, focus strategies became a critical pathway for gaining a competitive edge and ensuring sustainability for many companies operating globally.

In the African context, where economic conditions varied widely, organizations had to adapt their strategies to local markets while incorporating global best practices. Research into the use of focus strategies by African businesses became vital, particularly as these strategies intersected with the continent's economic growth and development. Africa, the world's second-largest and second-most populous continent, presented vast market opportunities alongside significant challenges (United Nations, 2019). The increasing demand for consumer goods and services, fueled by rapid urbanization and a growing middle class, underscored the relevance of focus strategies (Deloitte, 2022). However, firms faced obstacles such as infrastructure limitations, regulatory challenges, and operational

complexities as they sought to capitalize on this growth (KPMG, 2022). Thus, implementing focus strategies served as a viable solution for businesses to navigate these challenges by concentrating resources on specific customer segments or geographic areas.

Nigeria, Africa's largest economy, was characterized by abundant natural resources, a youthful population, and increasing technological adoption (World Bank, 2022). Nonetheless, the business environment was hindered by infrastructure deficits, foreign exchange fluctuations, and policy uncertainty (PWC, 2021). Within Nigeria's consumer industry, competition intensified from both international and domestic players. Adopting a focused strategy enabled companies to better address the needs of Nigerian consumers amidst these challenges.

Abuja, as Nigeria's capital city and a major commercial hub, faced constraints in business activities due to infrastructure and skills shortages (NBS, 2020). With a burgeoning middle class and an influx of professionals, consumer demand in Abuja rose across various income segments (Euromonitor, 2021). Tailored marketing efforts and localized production enabled consumer goods companies to effectively compete in this unique geographic market.

Guinness Nigeria Plc, a subsidiary of Diageo Plc and a global leader in beverage alcohol, adopted a product-focused strategy, concentrating on its iconic beer and spirits brands while expanding through acquisitions (Guinness Nigeria, 2022). This approach strengthened their market share; however, increased competition and shifting consumption patterns presented challenges (Bamkele & Oluwafemi, 2021). Analyzing Guinness Nigeria's performance in terms of productivity, quality, and delivery time revealed whether their focus strategy yielded organizational benefits, particularly in the Abuja area.

The central problem of this research was to evaluate the effectiveness of focus strategies employed by consumer goods companies in Abuja, specifically in terms of productivity, quality, and delivery time. This study aimed to achieve the following objectives: to assess the impact of product-focused strategies on

organizational productivity in Guinness Nigeria Plc; to evaluate the influence of focus strategies on product quality and delivery time within the Abuja market; and to identify the challenges faced by consumer goods companies in implementing focus strategies in Abuja.

Based on these objectives, the following hypotheses were tested: There was a significant relationship between product-focused strategies and organizational productivity in Guinness Nigeria Plc; and There was a significant effect of focus strategies on product quality and delivery time within the Abuja market. By exploring these aspects, the research aimed to provide insights that guided Nigerian firms in developing focus strategies tailored to specific cities and market segments across this diverse country.

In Abuja, Nigeria's rapidly changing business environment, where economic conditions and market dynamics are in constant flux, organizations must adopt effective strategies to maintain sustained and optimal performance. Guinness Nigeria PLC, a key player in the country's competitive beverage industry, has pursued a product-focused strategy centered around its well-known beer and spirit brands (Guinness Nigeria, 2022). However, the company is increasingly facing competition from international brewers, local businesses, and alternative products amidst shifting consumer preferences (Euromonitor, 2021). These challenges are particularly evident in the Abuja market, where infrastructure limitations, supply chain complexities, and changing consumer demand patterns present significant obstacles for consumer goods companies (NBS, 2020). Although Guinness Nigeria PLC has secured a strong market share nationwide through its product-focused approach, competitive pressures and operational challenges in Abuja may impede the successful execution of this strategy in terms of enhancing organizational performance.

Issues such as stagnant market share in Abuja (Agbo & Chijoke-Mgbame, 2021), declining productivity at the Abuja brewery (Kalu et al., 2021), and increasing consumer complaints regarding product availability and quality in Abuja (Adegbuyi et al., 2018) suggest potential misalignments between Guinness Nigeria's overall product-focused strategy and its

effective implementation in the unique Abuja market. There is a need to investigate whether Guinness Nigeria PLC's product-centric strategy has delivered a sustainable competitive advantage and improved performance specifically in the Abuja region, considering its distinct infrastructure and operational challenges.

Evaluating Guinness Nigeria's performance in Abuja through key metrics such as market share, productivity, product quality, and delivery times will provide crucial insights into the local application and impact of their broader product-focused strategy (Bamkele & Oluwafemi, 2021). This assessment could inform decisions on refining the focus strategy to achieve stronger organizational performance in Abuja and other similarly challenging markets in Nigeria. The study also contributes to the scholarly understanding of the contextual factors that affect the effectiveness of focus strategies across diverse geographical segments within Guinness Nigeria PLC.

Research Questions

The following questions were posed in light of the previously mentioned problems, and they were addressed during the course of this study:

- i. How does market focus strategy positively impact performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja?
- ii. To what extent does product focus strategy significantly affect the performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja?

Objectives of the Study

The general objective of this study is to examine the Effect of focus strategy on organizational performance of Guinness Nigeria PLC, Abuja. The specific objectives are to;

- i. Explore how market focus strategy positively impact performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja.
- ii. Examine the extent to which product focus strategy significantly affect the performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja.

Research Hypotheses

The following hypotheses were developed in a null form in order to guide this study:

H₀₁: Market focus strategy does not significantly impact on performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja.

H₀₂: Product focus strategy does not significantly affect the performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc, Abuja.

Scope and Limitation of the Study

This study investigates the "Effect of Focus Strategy on the Performance of Guinness Nigeria PLC in Abuja." Abuja was chosen as the study location due to its critical role as the capital city, reflecting both economic importance and offering a distinctive business environment that represents Nigeria's administrative and corporate center. The study covers the period from 2015 to 2023, corresponding with Guinness Nigeria PLC's strategic planning cycles, which allows for an in-depth analysis of the long-term effects of focus strategies. The study focuses on Product Focus and Market Focus as key proxies for the focus strategy, selected for their relevance in capturing the diverse aspects of strategic decision-making. These proxies collectively impact the dependent variable, performance, which is measured through Productivity, Product Quality, and Delivery Times. The selection of these proxies is based on their direct influence on the brewing industry, enabling a detailed examination of how specific elements of the focus strategy contribute to the overall performance of Guinness Nigeria PLC in Abuja. It is also important to highlight that this study is based on a perception survey, where participants' views and attitudes towards these focus strategies were analyzed to determine their impact on organizational performance.

2.0 LITERATURE REVIEW AND THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

Conceptual Issues

Concept of Focus Strategy

Porter (1980) argued that a focus strategy involved directing a company's resources and efforts toward meeting the unique needs of a defined market segment, typically through cost efficiency or differentiation. Guinness Nigeria PLC illustrated this approach by concentrating on a product-focused strategy centered around its popular beer and spirit brands, such as Guinness Stout and Harp Lager, which were deeply rooted in the Nigerian market (Guinness Nigeria, 2022). This strategic focus was consistent with Porter's (1985) framework, which emphasized dividing the market into distinct segments to better serve specific consumer groups, ultimately fostering strong customer loyalty and enabling a specialized expertise within the niche. While this approach allowed for growth through leveraging unique assets and capabilities (Parnell, 2011), it also posed risks of rigidity if the organization did not adapt to evolving consumer preferences and new niche markets (Barney, 2022). Guinness Nigeria's commitment to product specialization, market segmentation, and cost efficiency aligned closely with Porter's strategy framework, helping the company address targeted market needs while enhancing operational effectiveness (Gupta & Lonial, 2020). The study sought to assess how Guinness Nigeria's product-centric strategy influenced its competitive standing within the dynamic Nigerian brewing industry.

Market Focus Strategy

Market focus is a strategic approach that involves channeling a company's resources and efforts toward a particular target market or segment. This strategy includes identifying and prioritizing specific customer groups or geographic areas where the company intends to concentrate its marketing and operational efforts. In today's business environment, market focus has become increasingly important as organizations recognize the value of customizing their products and services to address the unique needs and preferences of specific customer segments.

Recent studies by Kumar and Venkatesan (2018) highlight the crucial role of market focus in driving business growth. The authors argue that businesses adopting a more targeted market approach can achieve higher levels of customer satisfaction and loyalty. This perspective aligns with the idea that understanding and meeting the distinct demands of a particular market can lead to more effective marketing strategies and a stronger competitive advantage.

Product Focus Strategy

Product focus is a strategic approach that involves dedicating resources, efforts, and attention to a specific set of products or services within a company's portfolio. This strategy aims to excel in particular market segments by tailoring offerings to meet the distinct needs and preferences of targeted customers.

Recent literature, such as the work by Li and Wang (2015), has highlighted the effectiveness of product focus when combined with supply chain integration. Their study shows that companies that concentrate on a core range of products while collaborating closely with suppliers and logistics partners experience significantly improved delivery performance.

Additionally, the strategic value of product focus is evident in the B2B e-commerce sector. A study by Zhu, Xu, and Ren (2015) on China's industrial equipment industry found that narrowing product offerings leads to faster delivery times. This approach reduces the complexity of order processing, enhances coordination with suppliers, and improves inventory management, resulting in shorter waiting times for B2B customers.

The Concept of Organizational Performance

Organizational performance is a complex concept that reflects how effectively and efficiently an organization achieves its goals and objectives. Different scholars and researchers have offered various definitions and measurement approaches for organizational performance. Recently, the understanding of this concept has evolved to better capture the dynamic nature of modern business environments.

One common definition of organizational performance is the organization's overall ability to meet its strategic goals and deliver

value to its stakeholders (Kaplan & Norton, 2016). This perspective typically includes evaluating financial metrics, customer satisfaction, internal processes, and learning and growth through a balanced scorecard approach. Kaplan and Norton's balanced scorecard framework offers a comprehensive view of performance that extends beyond traditional financial measures.

Additionally, organizational performance is not limited to financial results. Scholars like Deming (2018) advocated for a broader perspective that includes product and service quality, innovation, and employee satisfaction. This comprehensive view aligns with the contemporary understanding that sustained success requires considering both internal and external factors that impact an organization.

2.3 Theoretical Framework

Resource-Based View (RBV):

The Resource-Based View (RBV) was a strategic management theory that emerged in the late 20th century, with foundational contributions from scholars such as Edith Penrose, Birger Wernerfelt, and Jay Barney. Although Penrose's work in the 1950s laid the groundwork, it was Barney who formalized and popularized the theory in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

The RBV posited that a firm's sustained competitive advantage and superior performance stemmed from its unique and valuable resources. These resources encompassed both tangible and intangible assets, capabilities, and competencies that were rare and difficult for competitors to replicate. Examples included physical assets, human capital, organizational routines, brand reputation, and technological expertise.

In studying the effect of focus strategy on organizational performance at Guinness Nigeria PLC in Abuja, the RBV proved highly relevant. The focus strategy comprising market focus, product focus, and cost focus aligned with the core principles of RBV. According to this perspective, for Guinness Nigeria PLC to achieve sustained competitive advantage and improved performance, it needed to effectively leverage its unique resources within these strategic areas.

For instance, the market focus dimension was seen as a valuable resource that allowed the company to tailor its products and services to meet the specific needs of targeted market segments, potentially fostering a strong, loyal customer base. Similarly, the product focus and cost focus dimensions represented resources that enabled the company to differentiate its products and optimize its cost structure, respectively.

The RBV framework assisted in analyzing how Guinness Nigeria PLC strategically utilized the dimensions of its focus strategy as unique and valuable resources. It encouraged a thorough examination of how these dimensions were integrated into the company's processes, routines, and capabilities, ultimately influencing performance metrics such as productivity, delivery time, and product quality. In essence, the RBV provided a foundation for understanding how the focus strategy, viewed as a set of unique resources, contributed to Guinness Nigeria PLC's competitive advantage and overall success in its market and industry.

2.4 Empirical Review

Jung and Kang (2023) explored the relationship between market focus and operational efficiency in the South Korean hospitality industry. Their study, based on survey data from 175 hotels, found a positive correlation between market focus and operational efficiency, measured through resource utilization and guest satisfaction. However, the reliance on self-reported data was a limitation, and the authors recommended incorporating objective performance metrics from external sources, such as financial reports or online booking platforms, to enhance the validity and generalizability of the findings. This comprehensive approach could strengthen the understanding of how market focus impacts operational efficiency, providing valuable insights for hospitality businesses to refine their strategies.

Wu and Li (2022) investigated the "diversification dilemma" in Chinese manufacturing firms, analyzing the effects of market focus and product diversification on productivity growth using a panel dataset of over 1,000 firms. They discovered that the highest productivity gains were achieved with a

combination of high market focus and moderate diversification, challenging the notion of pure specialization. However, the reliance on secondary data could obscure firm-specific details and industry dynamics. Future research could address this by including qualitative interviews and primary data collection to better understand the balance between specialization and diversification for optimizing productivity.

Xu and Lin (2021) examined the relationship between market focus and productivity in emerging economies, focusing on over 1,000 firms in China. Their study found that while market share alone does not guarantee higher productivity, combining market focus with complementary managerial practices and technological investments significantly enhances productivity. The study's focus on large firms may overlook the challenges faced by smaller businesses. Future research could include smaller firms and use mixed-methods approaches, such as interviews with entrepreneurs, to explore how market focus interacts with firm size, resource constraints, and industry context.

Caldas and Ferreira (2020) analyzed the impact of specialization versus diversification on labor productivity among small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) in Portugal. Their study, using survey data from over 500 SMEs, found that increased specialization consistently boosts labor productivity across both high- and low-tech sectors. A limitation of their study was the self-reported nature of the survey data, which could introduce bias. Future research could use a mixed-methods approach, incorporating objective performance metrics from official databases to enhance the validity and generalizability of the findings, offering valuable insights for SMEs to optimize their strategies.

Zhao and Song (2023) investigated the effect of product focus on supply chain performance within the automotive industry in China. Their case study of a leading automaker revealed that focusing on a core product range improved inventory management, reduced production complexity, and enhanced supplier collaboration, leading to better delivery performance. The limitation of this single case study affects the generalizability of the results. Future research could employ a mixed-methods

approach with quantitative data from a broader sample of automotive firms to provide a more generalizable understanding of the link between product focus and supply chain performance.

Zhang, Wang, and Li (2022) studied the interplay between product focus and operational agility in Chinese e-commerce. Their analysis of data from over 500 online retailers found that a moderate level of product focus, combined with flexible production and order fulfillment processes, minimized delivery times. However, the focus on China's e-commerce landscape may limit the applicability of the findings. Future research could replicate the study in different geographical contexts and e-commerce sectors, using mixed-methods approaches to explore how the balance between product focus and operational agility affects delivery times globally.

Shah and Golhar (2021) explored the relationship between product focus and order lead times in manufacturing, using data from over 200 Indian firms. Their study found that high product focus significantly reduces order lead times by streamlining production processes and improving resource allocation, even within a broad product mix. The regional focus on Indian manufacturers may limit the generalizability of the findings. Future research could expand to diverse geographies and industries, incorporating qualitative methods to explore the global applicability of product focus in reducing lead times and enhancing competitiveness.

Study Gap

Empirical studies by Jung and Kang (2023), Wu and Li (2022), Xu and Lin (2021), Caldas and Ferreira (2020), Zhao and Song (2023), Zhang et al., (2022), and Shah and Golhar (2021) have offered valuable insights into the link between focus strategy and organizational performance in various service industries. However, there is a notable lack of research specifically addressing the Nigerian business context. While existing studies vary in geography, methodology, and sample size, none have focused on the distinct challenges and opportunities within Nigeria. The proposed study on Guinness Nigeria PLC seeks to address this gap by investigating how focus strategy influences organizational performance in the Nigerian socio-economic environment.

This research will examine various dimensions of focus strategy, such as market and product focus, and will provide a detailed, context-specific analysis covering the period from 2015 to 2023, thereby offering a comprehensive understanding of how focus strategy impacts performance in Nigeria.

3.0 METHODOLOGY

The study used a descriptive research design to examine the impact of focus strategy on organizational performance at Guinness Nigeria PLC, Abuja, selecting a sample of 188 employees across diverse functional areas to capture varied perspectives. A structured questionnaire, featuring a Likert scale to assess agreement levels, was used to gather data directly relevant to the study's objectives. Yamane's formula determined the sample size, while a stratified sampling technique ensured proportional representation from departments such as Sales, Marketing, Administration, and Management. Data analysis included both descriptive and inferential statistics, with a regression model employed to analyze the relationships between focus strategy dimensions market, product, and cost focus and organizational performance indicators. Table 4.1 presented an analysis of the questionnaire distribution process at Guinness Nigeria PLC, revealing robust engagement among employees. Out of the 188 questionnaires distributed, 175 were successfully returned, resulting in a commendable response rate of 93.1%. This high percentage indicated strong participation and interest from the employees in contributing

test confirmed the questionnaire's clarity and relevance, while reliability was assessed using Cronbach's alpha, yielding robust values: 0.73 for Performance (PER), 0.76 for Market Focus (MFO), and 0.80 for Product Focus (PFO), all above the acceptable threshold of 0.7. Together, these steps ensured the study's methodological rigor, delivering reliable and valid measurements of how focus strategies contribute to organizational performance.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSIONS

Introduction

This chapter detailed the presentation, analysis, and discussion of respondents' opinions collected through the distributed questionnaires. Descriptive analysis was performed using simple percentages to describe the characteristics and distribution of the responses. For hypothesis testing, Multiple Regression analysis was employed using SPSS. This inferential statistical technique assessed the impact of the independent variables—Market Focus, Product Focus, and Cost Focus on organizational performance metrics such as Productivity, Delivery Time, and Product Quality over the past five years.

to the study. Conversely, 22 questionnaires remained unreturned, which accounted for 7.3% of the total distributed, suggesting minimal non-response. Overall, the data illustrated a significant commitment from the workforce to provide feedback, thereby enhancing the reliability and validity of the research findings.

Tests of Hypotheses

The study focused on assessing how the focus strategy impacts the organizational performance of Guinness Nigeria PLC in Abuja. It specifically evaluated and determined the effects of the various aspects of the independent variable (Focus Strategy),

including Market Focus and Product Focus, on the company's performance.

Test of Hypothesis I

H₀₁: Market focus strategy does not have a significant effect on the performance of Guinness Nigeria Plc.

Table 1 displays the regression analysis model summary where Market Focus (MFO) is used to predict the dependent variable. The R value of 0.804 indicates a strong positive correlation between MFO and the outcome variable. The R Square value of 0.647 shows that MFO explains about 64.7% of the variance in the dependent variable. The Adjusted R Square, at 0.645, is slightly lower than the R Square but adjusts for

the number of predictors, suggesting a well-fitting model. The standard error of 0.30112 represents the average distance of the observed values from the regression line. With a strong R value and high R Square, MFO is likely a significant predictor of the dependent variable, assuming the F-test confirms the model's overall significance.

Table 2 displays the ANOVA results for the regression analysis where Market Focus (MFO) is used to predict the dependent variable, PER. The regression sum of squares is 28.719, compared to the residual sum of squares of 15.687, indicating that a significant portion of the total variance (44.406) in PER is explained by MFO. With 1 degree of freedom (df) for the regression and 173 df for the residuals, the mean square for the regression is 28.719, while the mean square for the residuals is 0.091. The F value of 316.727, with a significance level (Sig.) of 0.000, is highly significant, indicating

that the model effectively explains the variance in PER. Since the p-value is less than 0.05, the null hypothesis is rejected, confirming that MFO is a significant predictor of PER.

Table 3 shows the coefficients for the regression model predicting the dependent variable, PER, with Market Focus (MFO) as the predictor. The unstandardized coefficient (B) for the constant is 0.929, with a standard error of 0.175 and a t-value of 5.306, which is statistically significant with a p-value of 0.000. The unstandardized coefficient for MFO is 0.786, with a standard error of 0.044 and a

highly significant t-value of 17.797 ($p = 0.000$). The standardized coefficient (Beta) for MFO is 0.804, indicating a strong positive effect of MFO on PER. Since the p-values are less than 0.05, the null hypothesis is rejected, confirming that MFO significantly predicts PER, with each unit increase in MFO associated with an approximate 0.786 unit increase in PER.

Test of Hypothesis II

Table 4 displays the model summary for a regression analysis where the dependent variable is predicted by Product Focus (PFO). The R value of 0.768 indicates a strong positive correlation between PFO and the dependent variable. The R Square value of 0.591 means that PFO accounts for 59.1% of the variance in the dependent variable. The Adjusted R Square value of 0.588, which accounts for the number of predictors in the model, suggests a well-

fitting model. The standard error of the estimate is 0.32420, reflecting the average deviation of observed values from the regression line. Given the strong R value and high R Square, PFO appears to be a significant predictor of the dependent variable, provided the F-test confirms the model's overall significance. The next step is to review the p-value from the ANOVA table to verify the model's significance if it is below 0.05.

Table 5 shows the ANOVA results for the regression analysis where Product Focus (PFO) predicts the dependent variable, PER. The regression sum of squares is 26.223, while the residual sum of squares is 18.183, indicating that a significant portion of the total variance (44.406) in PER is accounted for by PFO. With 1 degree of freedom for the regression and 173 degrees of freedom for the residuals, the mean

square for the regression is 26.223 and the mean square for the residuals is 0.105. The F value is 249.491 with a significance level (Sig.) of 0.000, which is highly significant. This result confirms that the model is statistically significant in explaining the variance in PER. Given that the p-value is less than 0.05, the null hypothesis is rejected, affirming that PFO significantly predicts PER.

Table 6 displays the coefficients for the regression analysis where Product Focus (PFO) predicts the dependent variable, PER. The unstandardized coefficient (B) for the constant is 1.511, with a standard error of 0.161, and a t-value of 9.399, which is statistically significant with a p-value of 0.000. The unstandardized coefficient for PFO is 0.643, with a standard error of 0.041, and a highly significant t-value of 15.795 ($p = 0.000$). The standardized coefficient (Beta) for PFO is 0.768, reflecting a strong positive impact of PFO on PER. With p-values below 0.05, the null hypothesis is rejected, confirming that PFO is a significant predictor of PER, where each unit increase in PFO leads to an approximate 0.643 unit increase in PER.

Discussion of the findings

Contrary to the null hypothesis (H01), the results reveal that market-focused strategies have a significant impact on the performance of Guinness Nigeria PLC. Table 3 demonstrates that implementing market-focused strategies substantially benefits the company's performance, as reflected by the majority of respondents who agree with this assertion. This supports the findings of studies such as those by Jung and Kang (2023) and Wu and Li (2022), which highlight the positive effects of market-focused strategies on organizational productivity. Goal-Setting Theory also supports this, suggesting that a clear market focus provides strategic direction that enhances employee motivation and performance (Locke & Latham, 2002).

Similarly, contrary to the null hypothesis (H02), the findings indicate that product-focused strategies are crucial for the performance of Guinness Nigeria PLC. Most respondents strongly agree that focusing on specific products and markets positively affects performance. This aligns with research by Xu and Lin (2021) and Caldas and Ferreira (2020), which emphasizes that a targeted product focus improves operational efficiency and timely delivery. Theoretical backing from Expectancy Theory suggests that employees are motivated to meet delivery deadlines when they see a direct link between their efforts and the expected results (Vroom, 1964).

CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATION

This study has thoroughly investigated focus strategies at Guinness Nigeria PLC, Abuja, specifically examining market, product, and cost-focused strategies. The empirical data collected through an extensive field survey has offered significant insights into how these strategies impact organizational performance.

The research provides valuable findings on the effects of market and product-focused strategies on performance at Guinness Nigeria PLC. The survey results highlight a positive relationship between market-focused strategies and improved performance, as well as the benefits of product-focused initiatives. These insights enhance the understanding of strategic management within the context of Guinness Nigeria PLC and offer practical implications for organizational leaders and policymakers. Supported by empirical evidence and consistent with existing literature, this study advances the discourse on strategic management and sets the stage for future research in the field.

The study, therefore, offers the following recommendations:

- i) Given the significant positive effect of market-focused strategies on performance, it is advisable for Guinness Nigeria PLC to persist in developing and implementing such strategies. By maintaining a clear strategic direction, the company can boost employee motivation and overall performance, ensuring sustained productivity and a

competitive edge. Continuous monitoring and evaluation of these strategies are also recommended to adapt to evolving market conditions and enhance their effectiveness. Empirical studies by Zhou and Li (2017) and Majumdar and Ghosh (2016) provide strong evidence supporting the positive impact of market-oriented strategies on organizational performance, reinforcing this recommendation.

- ii) In light of the positive impact of product-focused strategies on timely delivery, it is recommended that Guinness Nigeria PLC should continue to prioritize these strategies. By concentrating on specific markets and products, the company can improve operational efficiency and ensure timely delivery. Efforts should be made to clearly link employee efforts to desired outcomes to bolster motivation and performance. Regular reviews and adjustments to product strategies should be carried out to stay responsive to market dynamics and maintain a competitive advantage. Empirical evidence from Zhao and Song (2023) and Shah and Golhar (2021) highlights the benefits of product-focused approaches in optimizing delivery processes and enhancing service efficiency, supporting the need to align product strategies with customer expectations for continued success.

Contributions to knowledge

This study enhances understanding by empirically investigating the effects of market, product, and cost-focused strategies on the operational dynamics of Guinness Nigeria PLC.

Firstly, the research offers valuable insights into how various strategic dimensions impact organizational productivity. The findings, supported by empirical studies from Zhou and Li (2017) and Majumdar and Ghosh (2016), deepen the understanding of how market-

oriented strategies can drive operational efficiency and growth within a real-world business environment.

Secondly, the study provides new knowledge about the link between product-focused strategies and timely delivery. The evidence from Zhao and Song (2023) and Shah and Golhar (2021) reinforces the idea that concentrating on specific products positively affects delivery processes. This information is beneficial for organizations seeking to improve service efficiency and meet customer expectations by aligning product strategies with effective delivery operations.

Lastly, the study contributes to the body of knowledge by exploring the impact of cost-focused initiatives on product quality. Empirical findings from Chen and Tang (2021) and Wilkinson and Radnor (2019) offer a detailed perspective on how cost management strategies can help maintain high quality standards. This understanding is essential for organizations aiming to balance financial constraints with the need to deliver high-quality products, optimizing resources without compromising on quality.
